CONNECT

- 1. **Unclutter:** Come together with a Connect Kiss or a Connect Hug.
- Emotional Communion: take turns to share what you have written with your fiancé and unite with their heart. Read your prayer to each other.
- 3. At Home Pray it! Write your prayer up on a nice card and consider the following ways of 'praying it':
 - Include all, or some portion of, your prayer in your wedding programme, as part of your rehearsal dinner or in your wedding speech.
 - Recite your prayer each night between now and the wedding to keep you spiritually attuned to each other.
 - Keep your prayer to pray throughout your marriage, especially on your wedding anniversary.





At Home: spiritual intimacy

Fine Print

It's always a good idea to read the fine print before you sign on the dotted line and marriage in the Catholic Church is no different. Catholic Marriage is more than just a venue for a wedding service. Catholic Marriage has specific obligations and you need to be aware of these in order to make a free and informed commitment on your wedding day.

1. THE PERMANENCY OF MARRIAGE.

As marriage is a Sacrament that witnesses to God's permanent, faithful love, divorce is not possible for a valid Catholic marriage. Even if the marriage has been legally terminated, the couple is still considered to be married in the eyes of the Church. Couples who are civilly divorced can apply to the Church for an annulment, which is a declaration, after investigation, that the marriage was invalid; that is, from the beginning the marriage didn't meet the requirements of a Sacramental bond.

- THE FREEDOM TO MARRY. If either of the parties to this marriage have been previously married they are unable to have a Catholic wedding unless the previous marriage is annulled. The Catholic Church recognises marriages conducted in other Christian Churches or Christian communities.
- SEXUAL INTIMACY. Sexual intercourse is the sacred gesture that consummates a marriage and is an essential part of sacramental marriage. While some couples due to disability may have difficulty in this regard, the intent to be sexually intimate is considered essential.
- 4. **SEXUAL EXCLUSIVITY.** Sexual exclusivity is considered foundational to a Catholic Marriage and the wedding rings are explicitly noted as a "sign of love and fidelity". As Jesus himself defined adultery as 'even lusting after another' [Mt 5:28], sexual exclusivity includes the rejection of pornography.
- 5. **UNCONDITIONAL SHARING.** When a couple marries in the Catholic Church their material assets become shared property. Similarly both husband and wife are expected to share the responsibilities of a common life, especially the raising of children and the care of each other during times of illness. Prenuptial agreements are thus considered incompatible with Catholic marriages except in rare circumstances.

- 6. **OPENNESS TO CHILDREN.** On your wedding day, you will be asked if you will "accept children lovingly from God, and bring them up according to the law of Christ and his Church". All Catholic marriages are expected to be open to having children, except in the case of mature couples past the age of childbearing. This presumes that couples will plan their families according to the principles of 'conscious parenthood' (see session 5, extension activity) and will reject the use of contraception, sterilisation and abortion.
- 7. RAISING CHILDREN CATHOLIC. If you are not Catholic but are marrying a Catholic then, you are not responsible for raising your children in the Catholic faith, but you are committing to support your Catholic spouse's obligation to do this.

Clearly, not all couples in Catholic marriages fulfil all these requirements perfectly. Although the Church has high ambitions for us, yearning for each of us to have the fullness of life as promised by Christ, she does not demand perfection from us. She holds out these foundations of Catholic marriage as an invitation to deeper faith, greater love and more fulfilled living.

In choosing to marry in the Catholic Church you are committing to strive to live your married life according to the vision of the Church. It's a vision that will extend you and will lead you and your marriage towards deeper intimacy and love, but it is a vision that you must freely choose for yourselves.

At Home: wedding liturgy

In order to make your wedding ceremony personal and meaningful, you will need to select some prayers and scripture readings.

Traditionally, these readings include:

- · First Reading from the Old Testament
- Responsorial Psalm which may be sung or read
- · Second Reading from the New Testament
- · Gospel Reading from one of the Gospels

If you prefer you can omit the Second Reading, in which case the First Reading can be from either the Old or New Testaments.

There are a large number of suitable readings and prayer choices. Should you wish to use readings or prayers that are not part of the Church's liturgical selection, you will need to discuss it with your priest.

The **Rite of Marriage** (including the Statement of Intentions, Consent and Exchange of Rings) are sacred words forming the foundation of the Sacrament and cannot be changed, although there are some options within them.

All Catholic weddings have a **Liturgy of the Word** and the **Rite of Marriage**. Some also have a **Liturgy of the Eucharist** (called a **Nuptial Mass**). You will need to discuss with your priest whether or not you will have a Nuptial Mass. Generally, if either the bride or groom are not Catholic, the couple will opt **not** to have a Nuptial Mass.


VERSION 1

Activity: marital fitness plan

Challenges can confront our marriages at any time, often when we least expect it. Tool: **EVENING PRAYER**
